



Hello everyone and welcome to this Autumn edition



delighted to be asked to judge Litter Free Felixstowe's poster competition. The standard was excellent which made the job of picking the winners incredibly hard but thankfully BBC Radio Suffolk's Mark Murphy and Debbie Bartlett from Litter Free Felixstowe were on hand to help me. Congratulations to everyone who took part and particularly to the winners.

I was also pleased to help launch Mark Murphy's 'Don't Be A Tosser' campaign, which reminds people to clear up their litter and was a good the opportunity to promote the town on local radio too.

Inevitably things have markedly changed since the Summer edition once lockdown rules started to be eased. One major change for the town, which I am sure you will have all experienced, is the how the high street has adapted to support the town centre shopping environment. Subsequent to our discussions with local shopkeepers, Felixstowe Forward and the Felixstowe Chamber of Trade and Commerce, the decision was taken to pedestrianise the shared space stretch of Hamilton Road. Your responses to our follow-up survey showed a great deal of support for these measures and, as such, it will be continued for the longer-term. However, we will continue to monitor and remain flexible to changing conditions and your feedback. The most important thing is that people feel safe shopping in Felixstowe and confident about coming into the town.

It has been great to see so many people enjoying the fabulous weather we have been experiencing (although as I write this in late August following Storm Ellen we see how quickly that can change too). Our beaches and seafront have been exceptionally busy along the whole of the coastline, but I was reassured to see how most people seemed to respect social distancing. Many of the shopkeepers along the front I have spoken with have also been pleased with business, even with the obvious challenges.

One negative aspect has been the amount of litter left by a few inconsiderate individuals, despite the numerous additional litter bins and collections provided by East Suffolk Council. I would like to thank Norse for their hard work and all the Litter Free Felixstowe volunteers who have been doing an outstanding job tackling littering and raising awareness of this issue. Our recent success in returning the Blue Flag to Felixstowe once again reflects the pride we all share in our beautiful coastal town; and I was as proud to raise the Blue Flag as I was

On Saturday 15th August 2020 the Mayoress and I, with fellow Town Councillors, gathered at the War Memorial commemorate the 75th anniversary of VJ Day, which also coincided with the centenary of the unveiling of our War Memorial. Rev'd Andrew Dotchin gave, as ever, a truly poignant service. It was an unexpected pleasure to meet a family who had travelled from Sutton Coldfield to remember a relative whose name appears on the memorial. They told me they usually attend the service in November too. I thought it was a lovely gesture and it reflects our shared commitment to remembering those we lost during the wars.

Visit Felixstowe has continued its campaign to promote the High Street and our independent shops so, as I've not been able to get out as much as I would have liked, I have been hosting Zoom interviews with as many as I can. It was compelling to hear first-hand how they have adapted and how hard they have been working to stay afloat. Some businesses had only been open a few weeks before lockdown hit so it was great to hear that they are still operating and even thriving. Please do support our local shops whenever you can, they really do deliver a fantastic service.

There are 10 people who are either full or associate members of the committee and I think we make a great team. Town councillors Graham Newman and Margaret Morris are on the committee.

The pandemic has stopped most of our activities but we were able to organise an online conference using Zoom for members of the groups from the eight Fairtrade towns in Suffolk who are members of the Suffolk Association of Fairtrade Towns. The conference took place on 11th July.

Guest speakers were Mike Gidney, who lives near Woodbridge and who is chief executive of the Fairtrade Foundation, the national UK organisation which organises certification and Patrick Kaberia, a tea farmer who joined us live from Kenya and who visited Felixstowe in 2016. Between them they gave a good account of how the pandemic is affecting farmers and producers and how Fairtrade is providing funds to help combat the very real, current effects of climate change. The CoOp, M&S and Waitrose have also provided financial help.

We are also part way through a programme of distributing Fairtrade footballs funded by the CoOp to primary schools at assemblies.

Blue Flag flying again at Felixstowe

Felixstowe beach (Felixstowe South and Pier) is flying high after being named as one of country's best beaches by environmental charity Keep Britain Tidy, joining an elite of seaside towns scooping Blue Flag and Seaside Awards this year.

With the current travel restrictions and the likelihood of foreign holidays being cancelled, a day trip to a beach has been very popular.

Mayor of Felixstowe, Councillor Mark Jepson, said: "We are delighted to announce that Felixstowe has been recognised as one of the country's best beaches. To be awarded a Blue Flag, beaches must comply with several criteria covering environmental education and information, water quality, environmental management, safety, and services. It was a great team effort to achieve these awards and thanks must go to Felixstowe Town Council, Felixstowe Forward, East Suffolk Council as well as the army of volunteer litter-pickers who play a huge part in keeping the beach clean. We urge anyone visiting our fantastic beach to leave the beach as they find it, respect our resort and dispose of litter appropriately."

The Seaside Award recognises and rewards beaches in England that achieve the highest standards of beach management and, in the case of bathing beaches, meet the required standards for water quality. Felixstowe consistently meets the criteria for 'excellent' international bathing water quality standards and is the only beach in Suffolk to meet this exacting standard.


The Blue Flag was raised on Wednesday 5th August and is flying in Felixstowe as seafront services resume following COVID-19 guidelines.

Back in April once the pandemic and lockdown had been in place for a while, we made the difficult decision to announce that the Felixstowe Carnival weekend planned for 24-26 July 2020 would unfortunately no longer take place.

The decision to cancel the event took into account a number of factors, not least of course the scale of the current public health emergency and likely continuing restrictions to prevent the transmission of Coronavirus. In addition to everyone's safety, we were acutely aware that businesses - our supporters and suppliers among them – had been substantially affected; many unable to trade and when they were able to resume, there would be staffing and supply challenges to overcome.

We sincerely appreciate support from local businesses and organisations through sponsorship and advertising to finance Felixstowe Carnival. In light of the unprecedented challenges facing everyone we would not be reaching out for financial support this year and we refunded monies already received.

Sadly, during this process, we lost our beloved long serving Carnival committee member Dave Low, as he passed away after a long battle with cancer. He was a jack of all trades regarding the carnival. 9 times out of 10 if you needed anything, he had it, either in his trusty Land Rover or in his shed at home! He will be missed so much and we have dedicated our virtual carnival to him.

Felixstowe NCI returns to duty





Along with other organisations Felixstowe NCI was closed earlier in the year due to the coronavirus outbreak. We were subsequently able to open for shorter hours with single-person working, supported by a telephone buddy to ensure the safety of the watchkeeper on duty, and from the middle of July we have been on two-person watches. All of these activities are of course subject

to the strict Covid rules set by the government and NCI HQ for the safety of our volunteers.

The uncharacteristically fine weather has brought many sun-seekers to the beach in recent weeks and so our work atop Martello Tower 'P' is as important as ever, keeping eyes and ears on Felixstowe's beaches and inshore waters helping to keep everyone safe from the dangers of the sea.

A gentle reminder to make sure everyone in your party respects the power of the sea and tides. Take special care particularly when using small inflatables that can be dragged out to sea by the tide. Please also tether inflatables not in use so that they don't get blown out to sea with an offshore breeze, as these can be mistaken for someone in trouble and cause unnecessary emergency callouts.

As usual, our two live webcams are accessible from our website at www.coastwatch-felixstowe.co.uk, together with useful local maritime information, and water users can call us on channel 65 for radio checks and weather.


Felixstowe Society of Allotment and Leisure Gardeners (FSALG)





It is that time of year when allotment holders struggle home laden with produce, runner beans are being harvested by the sack full, tomatoes are ripening every day and our partners are com-plaining that there is hardly any space left in the freezer for any-thing else. Raspberries and strawberries have been consumed until we beginning to beginning to suffer from vitamin C over-load, and what we cannot eat has been turned into ice cream and puree. Fortunately friends, neighbours and families are on hand to take some of the surplus, and with so many people suffering from hardship this year, some of our members are supplying the food banks in the town with their surplus produce.

Having an allotment is not just about growing fruit and vegetables to eat, there are many additional benefits from growing ones own, Health and Wellbeing is now being recognised by the medical profession as a very important side effect of having a plot. Some GPs have even started a "Growing on Prescription" project to improve patients general health. They have identified that participants have benefited from increased independence, better mental health, and improved physical health too.



Felixstowe Town Council has four allotment sites, located at:

Cowpasture, Candlet Road, 306 plots

Ferry Road, 94 plots

Railway Hill, Coronation Drive, 37 plots

Taunton Road, 19 plots

Benefits of having an Allotment?

- An affordable source of fresh fruit and vegetables
- Reduces your exposure to pesticides
- Gives you fresh air and healthy exercise
- Helps reduce stress and can give you a sense of achievement
- Good for the environment, providing green spaces and wildlife habitats

 Plots which are cultivated to a high standard could even win one of the allotment prizes at the Felixstowe in Flower Awards.

Council offers a 40% discount on the basic allotment rent for Senior citizens (on evidence of being in receipt of state pension) or Long-Term Unemployed (on evidence of associated unemployment benefits) whether the allotment be let as a single or joint tenancy, provided that at least one tenant qualifies.

See our website for more information. There is now a short waiting list for allotments but we expect some more plots to become available later in the year. If you would like to be added to the waiting list please contact our Business Services Officer, Sue Faversham.

Felixstowe Men's Shed - Coping in Lockdown



Difficult times call for a different approach and Felixstowe Men's Shed (FMS) is no different. The Shed has opened on a Tuesday morning but is finding it very difficult to operate with the social distancing in place. On a positive note there is still a good turnout and sitting outside the workshop allows for some social interaction as we each bring our own drink and snacks.

It has not all been at a standstill, one outstanding story is a 'friend' of FMS has been George Newsom,

the former head greenkeeper at Felixstowe Golf Club. Although not a member he has been a keen supporter of FMS, when we were meeting at Sanctuary Housing and looking for a workshop he came and examined their lawn that was littered with weeds. He turned up with his cannister on his back and set about spraying the large grass area with his own mixture of weed and fertilizer. Within weeks it was transformed. This year George had been building planters at home in his workshop. FMS would supply sheets of plywood and the remainder of the construction would come from his stock of wood. He produced 20 planters and gave FMS £270 in June after costs. This despite being very unwell but in good spirits, George died in July this year aged 81 years young. All left over wood and preservatives he used have been donated to FMS by his relatives. We need more people like George who has demonstrated that life is for giving and not taking. Those of us who had the privilege of knowing George and enjoying a drink with him at the White Horse until lockdown will remember him with great affection. The biggest problem facing FMS is the lack of space, we are grateful to Felixstowe Museum for the use of their workshop but as we have grown so has the need for larger premises – so if there is anyone out there who has or knows of suitable premises please contact us on felixstowemensshed@gmail.com Thank you.

Every day, the news is full of the problems of littering across the country since the easing of Lockdown. Litter-Free Felixstowe has been trying a pro-active approach and in two four-day weekends over the summer 250 individual

litter-picks have taken place, including the beach, parks, woodland and streets. Volunteers have been encouraged to collect equipment previously reserved for group activities which they will now keep for the duration of the Covid-19 crisis to avoid any spread of the virus. Although working separately, by posting pictures to the LFF Facebook page, people feel like they were acting together as a community. It has been encouraging to see the increasing number of children getting involved wearing caps and t-shirts displaying the LFF logo. The group's efforts have certainly not been confined to litter-picking. Members have been speaking to local restaurants and businesses to reduce plastic waste. Education is key to spreading the message with a specially commissioned Litter-Free Felixstowe video involving young people being filmed over the summer months. Two children's books have been published 'Just One Child' and more recently 'Just One World'. Litter-Free Felixstowe also recently launched a poster competition to encourage people to avoid littering. The judges: local artist Bryony Graham, Mayor Mark Jepson and BBC Radio Suffolk's Mark Murphy all commented on the exceptionally high standard of entries including people from 8 years to 88 years. Together, it seems that the local community and visitors are united in keeping Felixstowe as litter-free as possible.

Landguard Nature Reserve

- a little flavour by Leonie Washington, the Landguard Ranger

Here in Felixstowe we are so very lucky to have the beautiful Landguard Nature Reserve right on our doorstep. Landguard is not only designated as a Local Nature Reserve (LNR) but is also a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), which, is a reflection of its considerable conservation value, specifically areas of vegetated shingle, which is a globally rare and vulnerable habitat and acid grassland that is declining.

One aspect of my role as Ranger is to help maintain the sites condition, which if you are a regular visitor to Landguard you will be quite familiar with the permanent conservation areas, temporary cordons, boardwalks, paths and steps that guide you around the reserve, allowing you to enjoy its beauty without negatively impacting its sensitive features. All these management practices need to be constantly monitored, repaired, and sometimes replaced to ensure that species continue to thrive. For instance, temporary cordons to protect shingle dwelling plants and ground nesting birds are installed with the help of volunteers every year. The cordons help to reduce trampling, therefore enabling plants to recover and recolonise and protect the nests of the Ringed Plover, a species that is particularly threatened by disturbance

and due to their colouring and size can easily be missed. These cordons may need to be moved or extended depending on where the bird's nest and will often need maintenance when posts are damaged or lost.

When Covid-19 first arrived and lockdown was implemented, the reserve was very much valued by locals, who continued to take their daily exercise or walk their dogs. As restrictions were eased visitor numbers grew and continued to rapidly increase as did the temperature! in July and August. Increased visitor pressure has its pros and cons and managing its impact is another aspect of my role. For example, with an increase in visitors comes an increase in waste, which myself and many others diligently try to keep out of our waters and away from wildlife but it also gives me an opportunity to introduce first time visitors to the site and highlight some of its gems like the special plants on the shingle, the array of birds and invertebrates, where to search the shoreline to see marine life at low tide and the amazing views from the rifle butts and Fort.

I feel very privileged to be one of Landguard Nature Reserve's many custodians and get to enjoy it every day. It is a great place to walk, wildlife watch and unwind but don't take my word for it, come, and see for yourself.

East Suffolk Youth Employment Service Supporting Young People During the Pandemic



The East Suffolk Youth Employment Service was launched in November 2019 to provide routes to employment, education and training for young people aged 16-24 in East Suffolk.

Supported by grant funding from Suffolk Public Sector Leaders, Suffolk County Council, and the East Suffolk Partnership; Inspire Suffolk was commissioned to deliver a district-wide service operating from several premises strategically located in East Suffolk.

Unfortunately, the COVID-19 pandemic meant that premises had to be closed and Inspire Suffolk needed to re-imagine service delivery that ensured safety whilst maintaining the provision of high-quality support to young people.

The team at Inspire Suffolk turned to traditional telephony as their primary means of engaging with young people and accelerated the development and adoption of digital services to create a bespoke package of support that could address the needs of young people at this difficult time.

Today, young people can meet with an experienced Work Coach through a voice or video call where they can discuss their needs and aspirations.

Their Work Coach will then work with them to provide a tailored package of support that will help them identify and navigate appropriate pathways into employment, education, and/or training.

The recent launch of a brand-new website means that young people can now register for support from their mobile phones or computer, chat to a Work Coach and explore the training and employment opportunities available to them.

Garry Mills, Education Programmes Manager at Inspire Suffolk said that "Inspire Suffolk have seen an unprecedented level of demand for our Youth Employment Service across the East coast of Suffolk, with a 4-fold increase in referrals during the months of June and July. The launch of our new website (www.yessuffolk.co.uk) has been paramount to this increase and has enabled young people to access the service quickly at a time when they need support the most.

With so many young people facing uncertainty and a clear lack of training and employment opportunities, we are calling on all local employers to advertise their vacancies with us for free, so that we can continue to tackle youth unemployment together."

Since launch, the service has engaged with 368 young people, aged 16-24, from across East Suffolk and directly helped 62 young people access education, employment and/or training opportunities.

The ongoing pandemic means that more young people are likely to be concerned about their future and require the support and encouragement to tackle the uncertainty facing them.

Felixstowe Round Up South Seafront



Barnes Construction has now started work on a new landmark building in the heart of Felixstowe's south seafront bringing a new, exciting resort experience to the area.

16 Felixstowe Forward

Once completed next summer, this will house The Kitchen @ Martello Park, operated by the Dedham Boathouse Group, offering indoor and outdoor dining with unspoilt sea views.

Cllr Craig Rivett, East Suffolk's cabinet member for Economic Development, said: "Felixstowe is getting national recognition as one of the top seaside destinations in the country and as we hopefully begin to emerge from the coronavirus impact, providing much needed new facilities will be important.

"The striking design of the building is based around strong coastal themes and sympathetically balances its sensitive location, while also being an iconic visual draw to the area. Not only will it provide a new resort experience, attracting both local people and visitors, it will also support economic growth and provide new employment opportunities."

The development is part of a bigger project of ongoing investments in the South Seafront area, where Martello Park has already delivered new homes, a play area and new car parking facilities. The Council has also refurbished the two public shelters on the South Seafront and the long-term maintenance of its historic Martello, which forms the centrepiece of the park.

The £1.5 million project is funded by the Council and the Coastal Communities Fund (CCF) which was launched in 2012 to promote sustainable economic growth and jobs in coastal areas. CCF awarded the Council £950,000 grant funding which enabled the project to go ahead. Additional funding of £30,000 was also awarded from the Coastal Revival Fund.

Smart Towns

Felixstowe is set to benefit from a project which intends to digitally transform East Suffolk's market towns and help them recover from the impact of Covid-19. The project has been awarded a combined £450,000 in Government funding from two LEP run funding schemes – the Getting Building Fund and the Innovative Projects Fund.



The ambitious project will install digital town technology, such as free to use WiFi and anonymised footfall monitors in Felixstowe. This technology will also be supported by a data driven programme of town and business support to make best use of the new digital

technology and analysis. In addition, the project will deliver the Digital Business 'Springboard'. This innovative business support initiative aims to deliver bespoke digital diagnostics and interventions according to business need. This will operate as a 'business ecosystem', developing creative digital adaptations, expert workshops and digital upskilling of businesses and towns.

Cllr Craig Rivett, Deputy Leader of East Suffolk Council and cabinet member for Economic Development said: "This funding is very welcome news for East Suffolk and for the wider region. Many local businesses have been adversely affected by Covid-19 and the Smart Towns project will help ensure business sustainability during this difficult time. As well as offering free to use WiFi in town centres and footfall monitoring technology to help town councils and business groups improve services, the project will also act as a digital springboard for local businesses, enabling them to maximise the benefits of the digital economy."

Cllr Stephen Burroughes, East Suffolk's cabinet member for Customer Services, Operational Partnerships and Digital Transformation, said: "This is terrific news for the Smart Towns project and will enable the necessary infrastructure to be fully installed in Lowestoft and Felixstowe. We are doing all we can to encourage people back to our high streets and town centres and post Covid-19, there is now more emphasis on digital platforms. We want to help local businesses adapt to this by giving them the tools and support they need to reconnect with their customers, accelerate their recovery and help their business to thrive."

Re-Opening Felixstowe Safely

Felixstowe Town Council was pleased to work with partners on the re-opening of the town safely which included the Temporary Pedestrianisation of Hamilton Road Shared Space. With traffic restrictions in place people can more easily observe social distancing rules and enjoy a more relaxing culture of shopping, eating and drinking in Felixstowe's Town Centre.



The general public were asked their views on the temporary measures. Over 630 people responded to the online survey and you can view the results using this link https://www.surveymonkey.com/results/SM-69LDGP3G7/

To summarise some of the headline results:

- 85% would like to see the Temporary pedestrianisation extended
- 78% agree with the current arrangements
- 75% agree that they feel safer
- 72% would like a permanent pedestrianisation scheme

A business survey was also undertaken to ascertain the views of the businesses on Hamilton Road Shared Space.

- 94% would like to see the Temporary pedestrianisation extended
- 80% agree with the current arrangements
- 80% think their customers feel safer
- 68% would like to see pedestrianisation permanent

Based on these responses an application has been made to Suffolk Highways for an Experimental Traffic Regulation Order to extend the Pedestrianisation for 18 months.

Other re-opening safely measures have included allowing the businesses to 'spill out' along the seafront. Felixstowe Town Council is now asking for your feedback on these measures. Please take five minutes to complete the online survey at https://www.surveymonkey.co.uk/r/XSD6532

East Suffolk Community Partnerships



Last year, the East Suffolk Community Partnerships were created to "bring ideas to life" in eight separate partnership groups, covering the whole district. For the

next 3 years, £25,000 per partnership area, will be committed to tackling the priorities that were set at a series of community workshops. In addition, an overarching pot of £150,000 this year and £300,000 for each of the next three years will be available for the partnerships to bid for.

Each partnership had a total of £10,000 to use in the remaining months of last financial year. Reacting to the covid-19 crisis, The Felixstowe Peninsula Community Partnership decided to use their allocation to help combat the crippling effect it was having on its residents. Basic Life charity and FACTS received funding which enabled them to continue helping the shielded and residents on low income. This included the purchase of fuel vouchers, distributed to those most in need.

The Felixstowe Peninsula Community Partnership patch covers 12 parishes and towns. These include Felixstowe, Trimley St. Martin, Trimley St. Mary, Kirton, Falkenham, Levington, Stratton Hall, Nacton, Bucklesham, Newbourne, Hemley and Waldringfield. The Partnership - which is made up of a collective of representatives covering the whole patch - recently met and allocated a further £20,000 to support local projects.

£5,000 was awarded to the Friends of Felixstowe Library in support of their ambitions to enhance the children's section of the library. The project, which has also been awarded £10,000 from Felixstowe Town Council, will see the whole of the children's area refurbished to a modern and inclusive design.

Another £5,000 has been allocated to Felixstowe Academy towards providing a library for their students. Under the previous regime the school library was effectively withdrawn. However, as the new leaders strongly believe in supporting opportunities for reading as a core element of students' learning, the refreshed library will include kindles, tablets and magazines to inspire reading in different ways.

Finally, the Felixstowe Peninsula Community Partnership has introduced a grants scheme with a total pot of £10,000. The scheme is available to statutory, voluntary sector organisations and community groups who are located within the partnership area. The Community Partnership will consider applications and award grant funding that reflects its local priorities; isolation, mental health, obesity, low income and educational attainment.

Mark Jepson, Chair of the Felixstowe Peninsula Community Partnership, comments:

"I am delighted with the approach the Group has taken, supporting young people is key not only to their success but the success of the town in the future."

"The last few months has been incredibly difficult for everyone, I was pleased we are able to support two valuable charities that have been present in the town for a number of years and both provide an outstanding service. We will continue to support them and other charities that operate in and around the area for the foreseeable future, particularly with the risk of further spikes."

Throughout the last 5 months we have worked closely with East Suffolk Council, we took referrals from their Home But Not Alone team but also passed on to them any safeguarding concerns we became aware of through our work in the community. Special thanks to Chloe Lee from Eeast Suffolk Council who has been a key part of the FHH team in her role as liaison between the council and community groups as well as being our safeguarding touchpoint into wider services.

Thank you once again to everyone that has helped and supported FHH since its launch in March. We are all volunteers with families, jobs and other commitments but we, as a team, have achieved so much and helped so many people, everyone involved should feel proud.

The Laydens Community Café A Better Life for Everyone!





ABLE Felixstowe is the trading name of the Community Interest Company – A Brighter Life for Everyone – which is known as The Laydens. The Not-for-profit Laydens Community Café is situated at 12 Langley Avenue, Felixstowe, just off Grange Road at the Grange Farm Avenue roundabout.

The Community Café is mainly run by volunteers. During its opening hours from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Mondays to Fridays (other than Bank Holidays) it offers quality breakfasts and lunches as well as snacks and non-alcoholic drinks at very reasonable prices indeed. Service is known for its friendliness and the delicious meals which can be eaten in a 30-seater restaurant (or outside on picnic benches on sunny days). They are cooked in good hygienic conditions in a large kitchen. The kitchen was formerly used for a Meals on Wheels service provided by the Women's Royal Voluntary Service. Free wi-fi is available. It is wheelchair-friendly. Nearly 100 customer visits a week were made before the pandemic crisis.

Prices are very reasonable. Popular choices are:

£4.00: All-Day Breakfast of bacon, egg, sausage, tomatoes, potato cubes with a free drink (there are vegetarian options)

£3.75: Jacket Potatoes with cheese and beans or tuna and sweetcorn

Prior to the Covid-19 outbreak, The Laydens also offered free monthly confidential health advice from the Walton Parish Nurses and held popular craft mornings fortnightly. There have also been Sign Language and Spanish Conversation classes held there.

Important roadworks information

A14 junction 58, Seven Hills to junction 62, Felixstowe in both directions: resurfacing



Highways England are carrying out essential resurfacing works, between junctions 58 and 62, in

both directions. As part of this work additional maintenance works such as repairs to safety barriers and drainage defects, replacement of road markings and reflective studs, renewing road signs and updating technology assets will also be taking place. The work is planned to complete over 24 weeks starting 10 August.

Felixstowe's Joan Rich raises money for the NHS by walking the pathways of Allenby Park 102 times before her 102nd birthday in September. The gates and railings have been decorated with bunting and posters coloured by children from Fairfield Infant School. Local stores and houses display them too. Let's all support Joan!

As a child, and for more than half her adult life, Joan lived close to an Allenby Park – one in Felixstowe and, in the 1940s, one in Jerusalem. Not just a WW2 veteran, Joan worked for the NHS herself, in Hillingdon Hospital in the 1950s, and from 1964 at Felixstowe General Hospital in the outpatient department, until retiring in 1978.

She remembers retrieving patients from the park. 'Even though they were treated very well,' she says, 'some preferred to be recovering in the lovely park!' Forty-two years later, Joan is marching round it, but without patients: just birds singing, children playing, dog walkers, picnickers relaxing on the grass, footballers, and people exercising. Some, like Joan, have walking aids.

Home, But Not Alone Supporting vulnerable people in Suffolk Coronavirus Emergency Phoneline 0 0800 876 6926

The 'Home But Not Alone' service was launched at the beginning of the Covid-19 lockdown period, to help connect people who want to volunteer in their communities with neighbours who are most in need, County wide.

The telephone number for those in genuine need of help, is freephone **0800 876 6926** and is staffed from **9am to 5pm**, seven days a week. The request for help is filtered down to the local communities' officer, to match the request for help with an appropriate offer of support.

In line with changes to Government guidance to those who have been shielding, from 5pm on July 31st the Home But Not Alone phone line will no longer provide:
Free emergency food deliveries
Medicine deliveries

Shielded residents in Suffolk have been written to by Government and are aware of these changes.

For the short-term, the team at Home, But Not Alone will still be able to offer help and advice to those most vulnerable in our communities and signpost to neighbourhood or countywide support.

As the Government continue to lift restrictions, especially for those who are shielding, and the levels of COVID-19 continue to fall, the level of support on offer in Suffolk is being reviewed. This may mean that further changes may be announced to the support offered by Home, But Not Alone in the future. However, these services are designed to be reintroduced and stood up once again if there is a significant local outbreak. We will keep you updated on further changes.

Thank you for your support of the Home, But Not Alone service. We are incredibly proud of the fact we have been able to work together to help thousands of people during the most acute challenges of lockdown. This help has been made possible by the hundreds of community and neighbourhood groups in Suffolk and a significant number of volunteers. Thank you Suffolk!

Chloe Lee (Communities Officer for this area) has been working closely with different charities and organisations throughout this time. This has been critical to ensure the community has access to the appropriate support.

Basic Life Charity has been one of those Chloe has been in close contact with. They adapted their Food Bank to adhere to social distancing guidelines and worked alongside FACTS (Community Transport) to deliver essential food supplies to residents who are self-isolating or shielding who have been referred to the Communities team for help. In addition, FACTS have been delivering prescription medication from The Grove Pharmacy to residents aged over 70. This has been a huge help and has alleviated people's worries about being able to access the medicines they need during this time.

The entire district has seen a fantastic community response to the pandemic with groups and action being established quickly to help those most in need. In Felixstowe, Helping Hand's volunteers, led by Town Councillor Darren Aitchison, are a key example of local people going above and beyond to help a neighbour.

The Salvation Army has also provided essential support during this crisis by providing food parcels and hot meals to the most vulnerable. They have also created entertainment packs, delivered toys and outdoor games to families, and run a weekly zoom group for children full of songs, activities and competitions.

Chloe Lee is looking forward to linking back with community groups and organisations, as they prepare for post covid and the 'new normal'. She would like to hear from local groups and clubs on how they are adapting to enable people to pursue their interests and help support each other.
